LAF Report Case Updates

Schuster v. Berea College — The Kentucky Supreme Court issued a ruling on August 19, 2009, in favor of Claire Schuster and her pay discrimination case against Berea College, denying the college's motion for discretionary review.

In November 2009, however, the Madison County Court of Appeals ruled on a motion submitted by Berea College, denying Schuster the right to a new trial and remanding the case back to the appeals court for clarification. Currently, Berea College is sending its arguments to the appeals court, and Schuster will respond.

Brenda moved back to the Bay Area in 2005 and in 2006 became a docent at Tilden Park Botanic garden. She is a member of Ohlone Audubon Society and leads birding field trips. She has for more than 15 years, surveyed bird routes for the USGS Breeding Bird Survey. She and her husband travel a couple of times a year bird watching - Africa, Australia, and South

She has played piano since elementary school, and has always been a hiker and camper. She reads a lot and has been active in a book group for many years. She now spends quite a lot of time in her extensive native plant garden. She also is an opera/symphony fan.

Jennifer Ong: Jennifer was born in Quezon City, Philippines and moved with her family at 11 y.o. to San Leandro, Ca. A product of the California public school system, Jennifer attended Bancroft Junior High School and San Leandro High School. She then acquired her Bachelor of Science degree in Health Science from California State University East Bay. She attained her Doctor of Optometry degree from the University of California Berkeley School of Optometry. Dr. Ong is currently the owner and sole practitioner of her Alameda optometric practice. She resides in Hayward, California.

Her passion is community service benefiting women and children's issues, the environment and protection of wildlife as well as programs that help promote the safety and healthy sustainable progress of her community. Jennifer also enjoys learning new languages. She is fluent in Tagalog and converses in Spanish, Romanian, and a Filipino dialect called Ilocano.

In her spare time, Jennifer enjoys reading and learning about a variety of topics and spending time with fun loving friends and family. Whenever time allows, she makes an effort to also return to other passions such as spelunking, horseback riding, cross country skiing, fly fishing, indoor climbing, weight training and watching movies.

Connie Rusk: A lifelong East Bay resident, Connie left only for some time at UC Davis, followed by UC Berkeley where she earned a BA in journalism. Many years later, she went to USF for a master's in writing. After some years of happy stay-at-home mothering, she was a staff writer at the Daily Review in the 1970s and 1980s, covering beats as various as San Leandro government, police and crime, and colleges. Then came 12 years at Saint Mary's College of California doing public relations, including writing for and editing the alumni magazine, cultivating the media, and community involvement in Moraga. "I loved both jobs," she reports. She was widowed after 33 years of happy marriage (previously super-healthy husband Bob died of the same brain cancer that killed Ted Kennedy). Retirement brought travel, including volunteer teaching in Poland, and community involvement. "I was in AAUW for a few years, but dropped out when I went back to full-time work," she said. The book group was her favorite activity, but with the late Marilyn Shea she did ecology presentations at local schools, and worked on the sign ordinance for Hayward. Now two antiquing clubs, League of Women Voters, and the Eden Garden Club compete for her time. She tutors adults through Literacy Plus at the Hayward Library.

Rekindling the gender-bias debate

Bias may not be the only reason behind women's underrepresentation in science, maths and engineering. By Karen Kaplan

It is almost five years since Harvard University's thenpresident Lawrence Summers made his controversial remarks about the innate differences between men's and women's skills in science and maths. Now, a book is reigniting the debate with equally contentious views about why female scientists have problems advancing in academia. *The Science on Women in Science* (AEI Press; 2009) is a collection of nine essays assembled and edited by former philosophy professor Christina Hoff Sommers The book's aim, says Sommers, is to convince policymakers and others that gender bias may not be the primary cause of the under-representation of women in science.

Six of the nine essays, including Sommers's own contribution, contend that innate gender differences, not bias, prompt men to be more interested than women in science, maths and engineering. Published by the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research (AEI), a right-leaning think tank based in Washington DC, the book is Sommers's rejoinder to *Beyond Bias and Barriers*, a 2007 report by the US National Academy of Sciences, the National Academy of Engineering and the Institute of Medicine. That study found that underrepresentation of women in high-level academic posts is caused largely by bias and by an institutional framework

AAUW Awards Campus Action Project Grants to 12 Institutions Projects Aim to Increase Women's Representation in Science and Math

WASHINGTON — AAUW has awarded \$50,000 in Campus Action Project (CAP) grants to 12 institutions across the country for the 2009–10 academic year. These projects will target some of the barriers to entering and staying in the science, technology, engineering, and mathematics fields faced by women and girls.

Each year, AAUW selects a project topic based on our mission statement. The 2009–10 CAP teams will focus on the issues raised by AAUW's upcoming 2010 research report, which will highlight key findings from recent research on women and girls in S/T/E/M in three areas: middle and high school, college and university, and the workplace.

AAUW picked 12 CAP teams from around the country to implement projects. The selected projects focus on mentoring and on exposing some of the barriers that girls experience in math and science, as well as on networking and professional development to retain college women in S/T/E/M fields. Projects also aim to raise awareness about women in these fields through initiatives such as documentary filmmaking and a poster contest. The projects will help to increase the number of young women entering and pursuing these fields of study.

The lack of women in the typically higher-wage math and science-related fields has significant implications for women's economic security as well as for the overall economy and our nation's global competitiveness. More women in these high-paying fields would help close the gender wage gap and would eliminate the U.S. shortage of workers in math, science, technology, and engineering fields .

"AAUW is breaking through educational barriers so that all women and girls have a fair chance, and that is exactly what the CAP teams selected this year are doing in their communities. Our teams are increasing the number of young women entering and staying in science and math-related fields by addressing the barriers they face in school, college, and the workplace," said Kate C. Farrar, director of AAUW's leadership programs.

AAUW will pay for one member of each team to present on her or his team's project at the 2010 AAUW/NASPA National Conference for College Women Student Leaders in Washington, D.C. The conference helps students connect with other students and with successful women while honing leadership skills for their work on campus and in their communities.
