#### **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**



The League of Woman Voters had a most interesting meeting on October 4<sup>th</sup>. California has adopted Common Core Standards for the future. This will be bringing about huge changes in the way that our children and grandchildren will learn in the public schools. The speakers were Norman Fobert who is a board member in San Lorenzo, Jim Negri the Superintendent of Castro Valley

Schools and Matt Wayne, the Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services in Hayward.

All of them talked about the use of computers as the way that the CCSS tests will be conducted. Every student needs to be proficient with the computer. The teaching methods will include much more collaboration between students and will

focus on reading and writing strategies. Increased evidence based writing and speaking opportunities will allow students to learn from what they read. Students will focus more on reading and writing to learn, paired with an increased amount of talking about what has been learned.

Since Governor Brown signed the bill stopping the Federally mandated testing, new testing will be developed by the SMARTER Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC).

Speaking of Governor Brown, he signed two bills that AAUW had been supporting. The first bill, SB770, expands the definition of family for whom a worker can take paid leave to include a seriously ill sibling, grandparent, grandchild or parent-in-law. The second bill, SB138, protects the personal and sensitive health information of individuals covered under another person's health insurance policy like a partner, spouse or parent.

AAUW is out there fighting for bills in every state and at the National level to make life better for women and girls. We should all be proud of the work that is done on our behalf.


## Carol Castagnozzi graduated from Syracuse University with a BA in English, followed




