# The PRESIDENT's MESSAGE

#### **Hello Branch Members**

Welcome to 2016. I hope you all enjoyed your holidays and are back and energized for the New Year. 2016 is going to be exciting for our Country, our State, and our County. It's a big election year with lots of contention, unknowns, and probably some surprises. Where does AAUW stand among all the rhetoric? Squarely on the side of equity and education for women and girls, of course!

I hope many of you watched President Obama's final State of the Union address in January. It was clear that President Obama believes that some of his policies could be rolled back if a Republican succeeds him, and the speech in many ways framed the 2016 campaign in terms of that choice. The speech's opening got right to the heart of what Obama sees as the unfinished business of his presidency. "I'll keep pushing for progress on the work that still needs doing. Fixing a broken immigration system. Protecting our kids from gun violence. Equal pay for equal work, paid leave, raising the minimum wage. All these things still matter to hardworking families; they are still the right thing to do; and I will not let up until they get done." The president also stressed his support for voting rights, and the need to find ways to remove barriers and encourage more women, especially younger and minority women, to vote. He said he intends to "travel the country to push for reforms," and we expect he'll find AAUW members waiting with pertinent questions at every stop. And, per usual, AAUW's priority issues were right in the thick of things. President Obama also decried the influence of money in politics, which has unique ramifications for women. Although women are the majority of registered voters, studies show we are less likely to make political contributions (hello, gender pay gap!), and women list fundraising as their biggest barrier to running for elected office. If money remains the most respected and effective form of speech, women become even more marginalized. Despite representing more than 50 percent of the nation's population, women occupy far too few of the leadership roles in the United States: Less than a quarter of college presidents, just a fifth of the members of Congress, about one-tenth of the governors, and only onetwentieth of Fortune 500 CEOs are women. This leadership gap is why AAUW is pushing forward in 2016 to cultivate women leaders and to pave the way for their rise in education, government, and the corporate world. Our Branch supports the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) by giving a \$1,000 scholarship to a deserving student to attend the 4-day event in Maryland.

Two key AAUW priorities missing from President Obama's last State of the Union address were the issues of ending violence against women, especially campus sexual assault, as well as the attacks on women's access to reproductive health services and birth control. That was disappointing to say the least, given the prominence of both issues in the country's national conversation in 2015. Our branch is actively working with local Colleges and Universities to air the important film "It Happened Here" to raise awareness of sexual assault on college campuses. #### **AAUW Gives Thanks**

#### **State Equal Pay Laws**

We are thankful for the growing number of legislatures across the country that are passing statewide equal pay laws! California Governor Jerry Brown (D-CA) signed into law the nation's strongest statewide equal pay law in October, which provides more legal tools for employees and ensures stronger salary transparency rules. New York passed a package of five bills that take on discrimination, sexual harassment, and pregnancy accommodations in the workplace. Illinois approved a law to ensure that all employers, no matter how many workers they employ, follow established equal pay policies. In North Dakota, the new law makes it harder for employers to use non-workrelated defenses to defeat pay discrimination claims. Both Oregon and Connecticut passed laws that prohibit employers from discriminating or retaliating against employees who discuss their wages. Finally, contractors in Delaware are now required to pay all employees equally.

#### The New 10

In June, the U.S. Department of the Treasury announced that a woman will be featured on the redesigned ten dollar bill in 2020. That year represents the 100th anniversary of women gaining the right to vote under the 19th Amendment. As the Treasury Department decides on the bill's new face, AAUW released a poll that asked members who they would choose (Nobel Prize-winning scientist Barbara McClintock won!). We're thankful to U.S. Treasurer Rosie Rios for inviting AAUW to a private roundtable with her to discuss the bill's redesign.

#### **Executive Order on Paid Leave**

President Barack Obama signed an <u>executive order</u> establishing paid sick leave for federal contractors. Under the policy, that should begin in 2017, federal contractors will be required to provide their employees at least seven days of earned paid sick leave. The policy also accounts for absence due to sexual assault or domestic violence.

#### U.S. Women's Soccer Team Wins World Cup

For the first time since 1999, the United States <u>women's</u> <u>national soccer team</u> won the FIFA World Cup. We're thankful for the team's remarkable achievement, and we think they should be paid equally for their championship win. Congress introduced resolutions that call on FIFA to pay men's and women's championship teams equally — not the current \$35 million to \$2 million ratio. Ask Congress to show its thanks by <u>urging them to cosponsor the resolution here!</u>

#### **Record Number of Women Serving in Congress**

A <u>record number of women</u> are serving the 114th Congress: 88 women in the House and 20 in the Senate. We are thankful for this historic representation of women serving in office, and we'll continue to work to grow their ranks. Only

278 women have served in the House, and half of them were elected after 1992; 23 out of the 46 women who have served in the Senate were elected after 1996.

# Tell Congress to Avoid Last-Minute Brinkmanship on the Omnibus!

Thank you to the AAUW Action Network advocates who made their voices heard by legislators over the last few weeks. As Congress worked to reach an agreement to fund the government through an omnibus spending bill, ideological policy riders threatened to stop the bill's progress. Nearly 6,000 messages were sent by Action Network to the House and Senate from all 50 states, urging them to avoid the policy riders and pass a funding bill to protect critical programs for Americans.

Congress' proposal avoids most of the damaging riders that AAUW opposed – such as ones to limit women's access to health care or block civil rights enforcement activities. While it is not a clean bill, it reflects many AAUW-priority policies that support women and families. Americans rely on these programs to stay safe, healthy, and secure—next year, Congress must avoid this last-minute brinkmanship!

Here are a few of the outcomes in the omnibus that AAUW considers wins:

No cuts to the Pell Grant program, allowing the maximum grant to increase to \$5,915 in the 2016-17 school year.

A policy rider to block the Department of Education's gainful employment rule, which helps protect consumers from bad career education programs, was defeated.

Violence Against Women Act programs see increased funding, including the campus grants to help end sexual violence.

A policy rider to defund Planned Parenthood and limit women's

access to health care was not included.

The federally funded, Washington, DC school voucher program was not reauthorized.

Your advocacy is an important part of AAUW's work on public policy priorities. The omnibus avoided many of the most problematic and ideological riders. Thank you for being a critical voice in supporting the funding of programs that keep Americans healthy and safe.

<u>Urge your members of Congress to avoid this last-minute</u> brinkmanship next year!
