Louisville Metro Council, Several States, Ban Salary History, But Philadelphia Ordinance Stalled

Last week, the Louisville, Kentucky Metro Council unanimously voted to prohibit the use of salary history during the hiring process. AAUW of Kentucky members were instrumental in achieving this victory. AAUW staff drafted the ordinance language, and AAUW of Kentucky members asked Louisville Metro Councilwoman Mary Woolridge to sponsor it. AAUW members then worked with the councilwoman to frame the issue, encouraging her to call it a "salary history ban" rather than a "pay equity bill" to mitigate opposition and engage more men, also impacted by the practice, in the conversation. The tactic worked and all present council members agreed to co-sponsor the ordinance and voted unanimously to pass it. The mayor is expected to sign it on Tuesday, May 22. AAUW of Kentucky members plan to take their fight to the statehouse in 2019.

Over the past few weeks several states have also advanced salary history bans. With AAUW of <u>Vermont</u> members in attendance, Gov. Phil Scott (R-VT) signed a bill into law on Friday, and similar bills are expected to be codified in <u>Connecticut</u>and <u>Hawaii</u> soon.

Unfortunately, it hasn't been all good news on the local equal pay front. A U.S. District Court judge recently struck down part of Philadelphia's citywide salary history ban, finding that prohibiting employers from asking about salary history violates the employers' First Amendment right to free speech. Still, the judge upheld a part of the ban that prohibits employers from relying on salary history during the hiring process. AAUW signed onto an amicus brief in support of the law.

Membership Renewal The Time is Now!

I sent out a renewal notice from National AAUW in early May. Many of you renewed online and others sent me checks.

WHY SHOULD WE CARE? WHAT IS THE RELEVANCE AND IMPACT OF AAUW NATIONALLY AND LOCALLY?

PAY EQUITY: Did you know that AAUW is committed to closing the pay gap for women in the U.S. by 2030? We have already taught 33,000 women to negotiate their salaries through our in-person AAUW Work Smart workshops. Our national office is completing work on a free online module that will train 10 million women in salary negotiation techniques by 2022.

ADVOCACY: Do you use AAUW's Two Minute Activist tool? This online tool allowed AAUW members and supporters to send 270,000 messages to members of Congress to demand stronger, after laws for women and girls last year. We continue our fight to uphold Title IX to ensure that women and girls have equal access to all fields and levels of education.

EDUCATION: Are you aware that AAUW is one of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women? Last year AAUW awarded \$3.7 million in fellowships and grants to 250 women and community projects, expanding women's potential and supporting their future promise.

I have two fellowships that I personally funded. If you came to our Fellowship Luncheon in either October or February, you met my fellow, Kim Long. I was privileged to attend the reading of her dissertation at Cal last Thursday. She explained her research and even showed a picture of the two of us taken at our luncheon and explained to the audience how much AAUW meant to her being able to finish her PhD in Neuroscience.

This past year Margaret Hankle's Research and Projects Grant was completed. This means that this money can now be used forever to help branch members in the U.S. work on special projects. AAUW National will give this money to branches that apply for these grants.

I will be sending out the invoice from National again for those who missed it last month. Your membership is vitally important, not only locally, but nationally, as you can see from the information above.

Many members have sent in money to support Tech Trek and NCCWSL when they renewed. Thank you for your generosity.



Celebrate Yourself and Learn to Say No: Niken Carpenter's Advice to Immigrant Women

When 2014–15 AAUW Career Development Grantee Niken Astari Carpenter first moved to the United States 11 years ago, she didn't know many people. She had worked on a task force for the president of Indonesia and served as a judge for the Supreme Court of Indonesia for nearly 12 years, but as a newcomer to Erie, Pennsylvania, she wanted something more than an impressive résumé: a sense of community. She worked unpaid jobs, pursued educational opportunities, and looked for ways to integrate into the community. One day she met AAUW members at a meeting for Global Friends, an interest group of the AAUW Erie (PA) Branch that consisted of immigrant women, newcomers to Erie, and community members who were interested in cultural immersion. There she found lifelong friends, mentors, and at last a connection to a community.

Today, she serves as the executive assistant to the mayor of Erie

and as the city's first Liaison to Refugees and Immigrants in addition to serving as president-elect of the Erie branch. She has also worked with Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf's

Advisory Commission on Asian American Pacific Affairs.

Carpenter paved a path to success in Indonesia and in the United States, but it did not come easy. "I was not raised by a mom," she says. "When I was a kid, my mom was still a teenager, so she was busy with her own life. I moved from one family to another family, from one neighbor to a different neighbor. I made money by selling vegetables at a traditional bazaar."

Members of the Erie branch encouraged her to apply to AAUW's Career Development Grant to fund her master's in management from Penn State University. They also made her realize that she needed to stop accepting unpaid positions. "They said to me, 'Look, Niken, we know you have a good heart and you want to help people, but at some point you need to learn how to say no.' I am really thankful that they were willing to guide me and help me figure out my priorities and teach me how to say no," she says.

The community connections and networking opportunities that AAUW offered also led Carpenter to her current position at city hall, where she represents the interests of Erie's refugee and immigrant population. As an immigrant herself, she's extremely passionate about her job. "Every immigrant story inspires me to do my job. I did not have the guidance, so I am glad I can provide some guidance to others," she says.

Though Carpenter has overcome great adversity to get where she is today, she still struggles with one thing in particular. "I have a hard time celebrating my accomplishments," she admits. "We [immigrant women] always forget to celebrate our achievements. We work hard, we work hard, we work hard, and once we get there we forget to praise ourselves."


