

# President's Message

Hello Branch Members. Welcome to 2020! This year, all over the country, people will celebrate the centennial of the passage of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the US Constitution which reads: "The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex."

Women first organized and fought for suffrage at the national level in July of 1848. Suffragists such as Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott convened a meeting of over 300 people in Seneca Falls, New York. In the following decades, many women marched, protested, lobbied, and even went to jail. By the 1870s, women pressured Congress to vote on an amendment that would recognize their suffrage rights. After decades of arguments for and against women's suffrage, Congress finally voted in favor of the 19th Amendment in 1919. At least 36 states were needed to vote in favor of it for it to become law. On June 10, 1919, Wisconsin became the first states to vote in favor, followed closely by Illinois and Michigan. By August 26, 1920, 36 states had ratified the amendment. Though passage of the 19th Amendment was a huge milestone for white women, the fight for women's suffrage was complex and interwoven with issues of civil and political rights for all Americans. Most women of color continued to be denied the vote for years and even generations. In fact, it was not until June 1924 that the US Congress passed the Indian Citizenship Act finally recognizing Native Americans as US citizens.

Today, most US citizens enjoy voting rights, but issues like voter purging and absentee ballot disqualification continue. In 2019 voter purging, due to out-of-date voter information, became contentious in Wisconsin where upwards of 200,000 voters would be purged from the rolls. Opponents argue this is unnecessary and a victory for conservatives since many of the voters being purged are registered Democrats. Proponents confirm letters were sent to voters giving them enough time to update their information and reinstate their voting eligibility. In addition, we've all read about the 2018 North Dakota law disallowing Voter IDs to have PO Box numbers, particularly disenfranchising Native Americans living on reservations from absentee voting.

These issues stress the ongoing need of informing the public of their rights and responsibilities to retain their inalienable right to vote, and to fight for fair and equitable legislation to allow all US Citizens equal access to voting. We've come along way from 1919, but the road to fair and equitable voting still has some bumps and ruts to be fixed. Be sure to encourage all your family, friends and neighbors to get out to vote this year. The California Primary will be held March 3, 2020. There's still time to register or update your registration at the CA Secretary of State website:
